Thank you for the letter about the proposed ban in parking on the high street.
I live at 127 on the same side of the road as the prohibition proposal for 107-121.
I wish to raise an objection on the main basis that without parked cars traffic will speed up in a dangerous manner.

The speed limit is 30mph and at this end of the high street it is wide and cars come quickly from both Bridge Street and from Morrisons. It is already hard to cross at busy periods and also hard to pull up as this is a section of road the traffic races along. A parking ban will make it more dangerous.

I am also concerned about the lack of parking in terms of the effect it will have on businesses - the butchers restaurants garage and charity shops all have people parking for short periods of time. Will the new development provide any alternative parking to help our businesses trade successfully?

Overall I there are a lot of yellow lines all the way from Hadleigh bridge and it would make sense to consider if they are necessary as increased parking would help slow the traffic speeds as well as support the businesses on the high street.

Please can you consider alternative options to this ban.

Consultation regarding prohibition of waiting in High Street Hadleigh

Thank you for the letter dated 13th June.

As a resident at 111 High Street, I have been kept informed about the development behind 109. Whilst not opposing development, I think that the proposed changes to parking you intend to make take scant account of those residents on the High Street. As a planning authority, I believe you should not penalise existing residents for planned growth in the town and, for any loss, alternative and additional provision ought to be available. Parking and car movements are a major issue in Hadleigh, and a strategy of slowly reducing spaces, whilst encouraging growth is poor planning practice. With poor Bus connections and no train links, cars are going to be a foreseeable planning matter to address. Putting in heads in sand is not good enough. The additional houses and flats behind 109 will add considerably to traffic, especially allowing for families visitors and deliveries. The bottle neck of Benton Street will be made worse, at a time when other planning matters also will impact here if agreed. A one-way traffic solution - though not without its difficulties, seems to be the only viable solution.

I would appreciate being kept informed on developments and decisions.

Subject: Prohibition of waiting and revocation - Order 201

Dear Heather Miller,
I am writing to express my objections to the above order proposing to limit parking outside 107-121 High Street, Hadleigh.

There is already very little parking available at the north end of the High Street and to remove it will certainly have an adverse impact on the shops and businesses there, not to mention the residents whose homes have no garages or parking spaces attached to their properties.

To remove these parking spaces will also make it very difficult for people with mobility problems to access these houses, shops, the solicitors' office, the restaurants, the B&B, and the very busy garage at that end of the High Street, as it is essential for the elderly and infirm to be able to park near these premises. The nearest car park is a long way back behind the Co-op.

Also, to remove these parking spaces will inevitably increase the speed at which traffic moves along that stretch of the road. With no police available these days to check on the speed of through traffic, and bearing in mind the width of the road at the north end of the High Street, it seems likely that accidents to both cars and pedestrians could well increase.

Please give these concerns your careful consideration.

Re: Consultation regarding prohibition of waiting in High Street, Hadleigh

In response to your letter dated 13 June 2016, relating to the above consultation and your proposal to impose 'no waiting at any time' (double yellow lines) outside nos 107 – 121 High Street, Hadleigh, we would comment as follows:

- Following an application to build a supermarket on the Brett Works site, with access from the High Street, via 109 High Street, the Secretary of State, in 2001, rejected the proposal stating that the creation of a wide entrance would not enhance the conservation area, and that the entrance would create traffic problems. Since that date, traffic has increased substantially and parking for residents and visitors to shops at the north end of the High Street (in the vicinity of the proposed restrictions) is frustratingly difficult on both sides of the road.

Whilst we appreciate that you are not concerned with the parking options for local residents, please bear in mind that although that side of the road is a restricted parking area, it does become accessible after 6pm, when residents and visitors to local restaurants are finding it increasingly difficult to park. This is a residential area, with the High Street being lined with town houses, whose only parking option is on street parking.

- Bearing in mind the proposed development behind 109 High Street has not yet received planning approval, this work should not go ahead until, or even if, approval is granted for the development and the entrance in that location.

We hope you take our very real concerns, as long standing residents on the High Street, into account

Re: Consultation regarding prohibition of waiting in High Street, Hadleigh

We act for Mr S T Goldthorp (otherwise for business purposes known as Mr David Tron), owner and occupier of Sun Court, 107 High Street, Hadleigh, Suffolk IP7 5EJ.

Our client is in his 90th year and is largely housebound. He has difficulty walking without a "zimmer frame" and is transported by car to visit his Doctor and hospital on a regular basis. It is essential, therefore, that he is able to arrange for a car to park outside his house for these purposes and in case of emergency.

Our client has always used the area to the front of his property for parking his vehicle and it would seem wholly inappropriate for you to now attempt to prevent such use in the future. Given that there is no present planning permission for the proposed development in place, we would also question your right to exercise the parking restrictions at this stage.

Our client will be objecting to part of the proposed development to the rear of his property and the use of his existing accessway adjoining number 109 High Street which, with visibility and access arrangements as currently exist, is totally unsuited to service and heavy traffic.
